

## **FOX CITIES TRAIL SUMMIT**

## WHY HOLD A TRAIL SUMMIT?

- Trails we have are heavily used.
- With 20 municipalities doing trails, coordination can be elusive.
- Major work is planned in the next few years.
- Fitness, recreation, alternative transportation, civic image and mental health are all at stake.

#### **GOALS**

- Foster broader dialogue across municipal boundaries, economic sectors and areas of interest.
- Make trails in the Fox Cities the best they can be for recreation and transportation.
- Improve the health of Fox Cities residents.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

- Coordinating active transportation and recreation routes will promote collaboration among municipal leaders in the counties, cities, villages and towns of the Fox Cities.
- Filling in gaps will link municipalities to each other and to state, county and local parks.
- Improving access to remote areas by trails will showcase what Imagine Fox Cities calls the "cultural and natural assets" we prize.
- Making trails more accessible will help overcome physical, cultural or knowledge barriers that may prevent some of our residents from experiencing trails and promote a feeling of "belonging" in an increasingly diverse community.


## Step #1

- Tourist attractions






## Step #2

We mapped known gaps and barriers to getting to the destinations by bicycle or walking

- Oshkosh/Winnebago County from Snell Road to CTH Y
- Nature's Way trail to Appleton
- CTH A Neenah to Oshkosh
- Prospect Ave./CTH BB to Loop the Little Lake
- Trail from the Fox Cities to High Cliff State Park
- Downtown Appleton to the Fox River Mall
- Little Chute to Apple Creek area of Appleton
- CTH ZZ from Kaukauna to Green Bay






## Step #3

### **BIG IDEAS**

What would the complete trail network look like?

Fox Cities connect to Green Bay.

Wiouwash Trail extends northward.

Looped trails connect riverfront parks.

North-south arteries through cities.

Neenah connects to Oshkosh

Fox Cities connect to High Cliff State Park.

#### WHY A BICYCLE & PEDESTRIAN PLAN?

- The urbanized areas of Calumet, Outagamie and Winnebago counties have more than **340 miles** of trails, with an additional **1,294 miles of sidewalks**.
- After two years of planning, community surveys, stakeholder involvement and public input, the Appleton (Fox Cities) Transportation Management Area and Oshkosh Metropolitan Planning Organization Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan was formally adopted in 2014, funded by a grant from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation.
- The region has seen the culture and infrastructure improve for bicycling and walking for active transportation and recreation.
- The Plan has helped achieve regionwide and MPO-level Complete Streets policies, a regionwide bicycle and pedestrian wayfinding guidebook, an established bicycle and pedestrian counting program, and cross-community collaboration to expand the bicycle and pedestrian network.



#### WHERE TO GO FROM HERE?

Partners ECWRPC, FCGI and the CFFVR will continue to support this initiative in these ways:

ECWRPC will use data gathered at the Trail Summit to strengthen the updating of its urbanized area bike and pedestrian plan.

CFFVR will continue to spark conversation and refer interested funders to assist with leveraging the projects on the horizon



FCGI will partner with ECWRPC to ensure that the maps are updated in a timely manner by all municipal partners. The nonprofit group will work as a unifier of Partnership projects in the region and supplement key connections with its various grant programs
